



Reducing the number of mentally ill in our jails

Law Enforcements span of influence- Intercept 0 and Intercept 1

Preexisting challenges

SBSO averages 300-500 mental health crisis calls a month Average time to resolve a MH call for patrol – 122 minutes (vs 20)

Santa Barbara is the only county in California where LE do not write 5150 holds

Preexisting challenges

16 LPS beds Population 450,000 Mobile practitioners are not all licensed


Wait times for practitioners could be 10 minutes- 3 hours





YEAR 1 OUTCOME DATA REVIEW

1,606

Mental-health flagged 911 calls were responded to by a COR unit in 2020 (**Dispatch**)

496

496 individuals had a total of **716** COR interactions in 2020, as captured by clinician data² (**Vertical Change**)

411

411 of those individuals also had BWELL service history⁴ (**Behavioral Wellness**), and **133** of these individuals interacted with the jail⁵

306


306 of those individuals also had 6 months of data available following their COR interaction

"Cohort" (used when analyzing historical service interaction and demographic summaries)


This set of individuals is our "pre/post Cohort" (used when analyzing system interactions 6 months prior to and following COR encounter)





COHORT OVERVIEW












COR AND PATROL RESPONSE UNIT MINUTES




2022 Preliminary Data January – September 25th, 2022
