

AB109: INITIAL PILOT POPULATION FOR CONNECTWELL SD



- > What services are needed?
- ➤ How should we prepare?



Manual data match among 17 County systems provided a point-in-time portrait of this population.

ConnectWellSD will provide the technology and process re-engineering to support:

- ☐ County staff team work.
- ☐ Client access to information.
- Analytics for monitoring, forecasting and resource allocation.

COMMUNITY TRANSITION CENTER (SAN D





- Implemented in January, 2013
- Eligibility determination for Medi-Cal
- Probation and Behavioral Health Screening Team co-located:
 - Initial identification of treatment needs
 - Screen and link offenders to appropriate treatment programs
- On-site detoxification and longterm residential treatment as necessary
- Linkage to community services

Working Together:

- > Probation Officers
- ➤ Behavioral Health (Mental Health and Alcohol and Drug Specialists)
- ➤ Nurse Case Manager





HIGH USERS OF 911




809 "Frequent Flyers" of City of SD 911 System (296 are homeless)

Fermanian Business and Economic Institute Point Loma Nazarene University

3 year pilot funded by United Way and City and County of San Diego

Father Joe's Villages operated the program
Participants identified through data matching
In 2010, 28 people cost the community \$3.5
million (Avg. \$125,000 per person per year)

Significant decreases in public costs

Only exits due to death

PROJECT 25 TOTAL COST SAVINGS





Net Return from Project 25



Fermanian Business and Economic Institute Point Loma Nazarene University

When factoring in the cost to provide the housing and services:

Total cost savings year 1 = \$1.6 million

Total cost savings year 2 = \$2.1 million

Total cost savings 2 years = \$3.7 million

Expanded the program to 20 more individuals with funding from 4 Medi-Cal Managed Care Organizations, SAMHSA, and SDHC
